Jim is a lifelong public-interest and capital-defense attorney who has spent the last 25 years as an assistant federal defender with the Philadelphia Capital Habeas Unit. Thirty of his 35 years of practice have been devoted solely to capital defense. Jim has represented death-sentenced individuals in 11 states in both state and federal court. In this capacity, He has represented several wrongly convicted individuals and, working in tandem with his colleagues, has helped free four such people.

Jim has been on the Board of Innocence Project Delaware since its inception. He and his family live in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley.

Jermaine was wrongly convicted in Delaware and spent 24 years on Delaware's death row for a crime he did not commit. Together, he and Jim have done presentations on many occasions, and how he tells his story is very poignant.

Innocence Project Delaware was established in 2018 as the only organization focusing on claims of actual innocence for people in Delaware who have been wrongfully convicted. The project provides pro bono services to investigate and seek relief for claims of wrongful conviction. It also provides post-exoneration support to individuals who have been exonerated.

It also looks to remedy the causes of wrongful convictions (e.g., official misconduct, bad science, eyewitness misidentification, and prejudice). When not working with specific individuals, the project helps educate the public about potential criminal justice reforms related to wrongful conviction as well as access to justice.

Housed at Widener University Delaware Law School, Innocence Project Delaware is in the advantageous position of having law students eager to work on these important issues in a clinical setting.
